## Food Allergy School Discussion Guide\*

### 1) Reviewing the Basics

- What is a food allergy?
- What causes an allergic reaction?
- What are the symptoms of an allergic reaction?
- What is the recommended treatment?
- What is on my child's Food Allergy Action Plan?

### 2) Minimizing the Risk of Allergen Exposure

- In the classroom:
  - Snacks
  - Birthday and Holiday Celebrations
  - Science experiments
  - Art projects
- In the lunchroom:
  - Seating arrangements
  - School-provided meals (ingredient lists; cross-contamination prevention)
  - Sanitation protocols
  - Hand washing AFTER eating
  - Lunchroom monitors
- In enrichment classes (music, PE, art)
- During before- and after- school activities
- On the bus
- On the playground
- During special situations:
  - Field trips
  - Substitute teachers, substitute nurse, new personnel
  - School-wide festivals or other celebrations

### 3) Responding to a Food Allergy Medical Emergency

- Annual training and education for staff on how to
  - (1) recognize symptoms of an allergic reaction and
  - (2) respond to a medical emergency
- Where will the epinephrine auto-injector be kept? Who will have access?
- What is the emergency protocol? (e.g., who will administer the epinephrine?, who will call the rescue squad?)
- Does the emergency protocol need to be adapted to different scenarios? (e.g., what if the allergic reaction occurs on the playground? on a field trip? on the school bus?)
